Subject: Complaint regarding relocation and cruelty inflicted to Stray/Pet dogs, restriction and repeatedly harassment of compassionate citizens – Reg

Ref: Refer to our letter even number dated 25.08.2015, 28.10.2015 and 14.08.2020 on the above subject. (Copy enclosed)

Sir/Madam,

With reference to the above cited subject, it is brought to the notice of the Board dated 12.03.21 by Ms. Rupina Arora from 27 Sikh Colony, Udaipur, Rajasthan stated that from last 15 years I am taking care of stray dogs and feeding them but the entire locality is now against me and head of the society is forcing me that they will get the dogs out of the society. Even people of the society are threatening and abusing me collectively gathering outside my house. cruelty inflicted to the stray/Pet dogs and harassed the compassionate citizens by threatening and abusing them. In this regard, it is stated that it is fundamental duty given under Article 51 A(g) of the Constitution of India and it states that "It shall be duty of every citizen of India to protect and improve the natural environment including forests, lakes, rivers and wild life and to have compassion for living creatures." The removal of dogs from its natural habitat or from the owner is a punishable offense under Section 3, Section 11(1) of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960 and violation of the directions of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India. A copy of the complaint letter is attached herewith for your ready reference.

- 2. It is informed that as per Indian law, stray dogs cannot be displaced and relocated to shelters (or beaten or driven away). They can merely be sterilized in the manner envisaged in the Animal Birth Control (Dogs) Rules, 2001, vaccinated, and then returned back to their original locations Rule 7(6). For the area-wise sterilization program that the law mandates shall be followed, dogs have to be returned back to their original habitat after sterilization and immunization. The rationale behind the same is that dogs, being territorial in nature, tend to fight off other dogs, and keep them from entering their territories; and in this manner, the dog population in each territory / within each locale, stabilizes, and then reduces. In any event, dogs cannot be displaced or relocated, and have to be returned back to the very localities that they are picked up from, after sterilization and immunization.
- 3. The Hon'ble Supreme court of India has also issued direction dated 07.05.2014 in matter of AWBI vs. A. Nagaraja & Ors to all the State Governments/UTs for implementation of the provisions of the PCA, Act,1960 and its rules effectively so as to prevent unnecessary pain or suffering to animals and also to take appropriate action against the offenders inflicting cruelty to animals.(copy enclosed)

4. The Board has also issued advisory to the States/UTs regarding welfare of animals and the copy of the same is attached for your information.

In view of the above it is requested to conduct an enquiry into the matter and take appropriate action against the offenders as per law forward a copy of the action taken report to the Board at the earliest.
